

Getting to the Heart of Dravet's Syndrome

On January 10, 2004 I was standing in a Los Angeles parking lot staring at the celebrity I most wanted to meet! I had impulsively decided only two days before that I would come to Los Angeles and hear this person speak. Now here we were about to get on the same elevator and ride to the conference room where others were waiting to hear this individual speak. Who was this famous person? It was Dr. Charlotte Dravet, world renowned pediatric neurologist who identified Dravet's Syndrome (formerly Severe Myoclonic Epilepsy in Infancy).

My six year-old daughter Teigan has Dravet's Syndrome. Teigan started having seizures at four months old. She would seize approximately once per month, a generalized tonic clonic lasting anywhere from 50 minutes to three hours. We were frequent visitors to the children's hospital where they would medically stop these seizures. After months of having no idea why this was happening to my child, we finally found the diagnosis - Dravet's Syndrome.

Dravet's Syndrome is relatively rare, and it is fairly "new", only being identified as its own disorder since 1982. It is characterized by seizures beginning in the first year of life. The seizures are generalized convulsive events, often thought to be febrile convulsions, and are usually extremely long in duration. Development is typical until around 18 months old, when signs of speech delay become apparent. Other delays soon follow. Multiple seizure types, including tonic, myoclonic, absence, and complex partials are usually emerging around this age. Dravet's is known to be unresponsive to conventional therapies. We were fortunate to hear of a trial medication being used in France to treat Dravet's, called Stiripentol. Our neurologist was able to arrange to obtain this medication for Teigan, and it has now been three years since we have needed the emergency room at Alberta Children's Hospital. Teigan still has seizures, but they are all under five minutes now.

Once it was determined that Teigan had this disorder, I looked high and low for information, and could find very little. I met some other parents on an American web site who had children with this same disorder, and we started our own little web group. We have

49 families from around the world who have a child with the disorder. It was through our web group that I learned Dr. Dravet would be speaking in Los Angeles.

The Epilepsy Association in Los Angeles had asked five neurologists who were collaborating on a book if they would mind addressing parents in an informal setting while they were all in town, and they agreed. There were about 40 parents from the Los Angeles area there. I think I was the only parent who had traveled in from outside the USA, but the conference was not well publicized, so it was more of a surprise that I was even there.

The doctors all presented on different topics, followed by a question and answer session. It was very informal and wonderful to have such a small group, as all of my questions were addressed. There was a wealth of information on all aspects of epilepsy and I made some wonderful contacts while there. I exchanged email addresses with three of the neurologists, and they are fantastic about sharing information that may be of interest to me.

I would strongly recommend that any parent who gets the opportunity to attend a seminar pertaining to epilepsy attend at least one of these presentations. It is interesting to learn how these doctors study and come to the conclusions that they do.

EPILEPSY EDUCATION MONTH

Calgary Mayor Dave Bronconnier and outgoing Red Deer Mayor, Gail Surkan, proclaimed November 2004 as Epilepsy Education Month in Calgary and Central Alberta.

This year, we launched a new poster and message: ***Epilepsy - Anyone Can Have a Seizure - Anyone Can Learn to Respond to a Seizure... Anyone... Even You.*** Participants portrayed in the poster are all affected by epilepsy. We wanted to portray a range of people of varying ages, backgrounds, and circumstances, since epilepsy does not discriminate. Virtually anyone can develop epilepsy at anytime in their life. Anyone, including our beloved family pets – portrayed on our poster by “Barney”, who is a precious companion to a member of our board. Just as anyone can get epilepsy, anyone can learn to assist with a seizure. We have taught people from five to eighty-five how to recognize and assist with seizures. On our poster, we have included a second dog, “Rudy”, who is able to assist his human companion with seizures. We hope this year’s poster will reinforce our message and encourage people from all walks of life to learn about epilepsy, seizures, and seizure first aid.

Assured Income for the Severely Handicapped (AISH) Program is Under Review – Make Your Voice Count!

The Honourable Clint Dunford, Minister of Alberta Human Resources and Employment, has established a Government MLA Committee to review the AISH Program, which provides income support and health benefits for Albertans with a permanent disability. Do you have suggestions, concerns, or comments about what you think AISH Programs should look like in the future? This is your opportunity to make your voice count. The questionnaire can be obtained on the Government of Alberta website at www.aishreview.gov.ab.ca, or you can call 310-4455 to get your copy. The deadline to submit your completed questionnaire and comments is November 30th, 2004.

Changes to Supports for Independence (SFI)

For those who receive Supports for Independence, you are most likely aware of changes that came into effect in May of 2004. For those who are not currently receiving SFI, there are some changes you will no doubt want to be aware of. Supports for Independence was replaced by "Alberta Works", a new program that integrates

- Employment and Training Services
- Income Support
- Health Benefits
- Child Support Services

The overall goal of Alberta Works is to help unemployed people find jobs, help low-income people cover their basic living costs, and help employers find skilled workers. Generally, it appears that those who receive support through this program will be expected to return to work as quickly as possible. Benefits may be available for those who experience short-term difficulties due to an illness, or other reason approved by the Benefit Worker. Some benefits, such as health benefits, may continue to be available after leaving the Income Support Program (via Alberta Adult/Child Health Benefit). A detailed guide about the new program, criteria, and application process is available on the Government of Alberta web-site at www.gov.ab.ca/hre/albertaworks. We were also recently provided with copies of the "Guide to Services for Lower-Income Albertans". The Epilepsy Association in Los Angeles will be holding another one of these presentations early next year, and I will definitely be attending once again. The plan is to have the same neurologists back and organize smaller groups to meet with particular neurologists who specialize in certain aspects. An example would be Dr. Dravet, who specializes in Myoclonic epilepsies, addressing parents who are affected by myoclonic seizures.

Some of the neurologists in attendance at the session included Dr. Renzo Guerrini (Italy) and Dr. Marco Medina (Honduras). If you are interested in hearing more about the conference, I can be reached through the Epilepsy Association of Calgary Office.
